## DEPARTMENT RULES

1. Entries must be grown by South Dakota exhibitor.
2. Only one entry may be made in each class per exhibitor.
3. Check-in area is marked. Exhibitors, vendors, and staff are allowed in the check-in area prior to judging. Please allow sufficient time for entering exhibits.
4. Exhibitor must write name of variety of fruits and vegetables on entry tag. If variety is unknown, then write "unknown variety" on entry tag.
5. Exhibit must contain the exact number of fruits, vegetables, cut flowers etc. required as stated in the class.
6. Horticulture Building will provide vases for fresh-cut flowers and paper plates for fruits and vegetables.
7. Potted plant weight limit is 40 pounds.
8. Division 8 - Arrangements must be the work of the exhibitor. Plant materials need not be grown by exhibitor.
9. Entries of an exhibitor cannot be used as part of a garden club, professional, florist, or greenhouse exhibit.
10. Care instructions may be included with each exhibit. Exhibitor cannot tamper, alter, or damage any exhibit.
11. Decayed, injured, or inferior specimens may not be exhibited. Horticulture superintendent and judge may determine if the exhibit is ineligible for competition.
12. Judging will take place on Wednesday, August 28 at 10 AM. Judges will consider the following:

- Taste in arrangements and attractiveness of collections.
- One 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place ribbon may be awarded in each class.
- Ribbons will not be awarded on inferior entries.
- If competition in a class is less than the number of awards offered, the judge has discretion to award lower ribbons and not award higher ribbons.
- Individual pieces, baskets of flowers, entries or parts of entries may not be taken from exhibit to be judged separately in any other class.
- Scoring assists in the preparation of exhibits and helpful when judging exhibits. Judges at their discretion may use the following guidelines:

13. After judging is completed, exhibitor may replace fruits, vegetables, and fresh-cut flowers that have deteriorated. When replacing exhibit, exhibitor must seek permission from Horticulture superintendent or Horticulture assistant.
14. Entire exhibits or parts of exhibits may not be taken from the Horticulture Building during the South Dakota State Fair.
15. Horticulture superintendent and Horticulture assistants may discard whole or parts of entries that detract from display. Entry tags, ribbons, containers, and accessories are removed from the exhibit and stored until the end of the South Dakota State Fair.
16. Exhibit pick up: for exhibitors living 120 miles or more from Huron may pick up their exhibits starting at 3 PM on Monday, September 2. Exhibitors that live within 120 miles from Huron may pick up their exhibits starting at 5 PM on Monday, September 2. Pick up will also be available on Tuesday, September 3 from 8 AM - 4 PM for all exhibitors. If personally unable to pick-up exhibit, exhibitor must sign a release authorizing an individual to pick-up exhibit.
17. Starting in 2024, all entries must be completed online at https://sdsf.fairwire.com. A step-by-step video with instructions on how to navigate the online entry platform, ShoWorks, can be found here (https://vimeo.com/922566991/66f0110c64?share=copy). If you require further assistance after watching the instructional video, please contact the SD State Fair Office. Paper entries will not be accepted.
18. The South Dakota State Fair office will accept entries between April 1-July 31 in all static departments. Horticulture entries will be accepted until August 9.
19. Only one entry may be made in each class unless stated otherwise in rules for that division/class. Online entries may be done in one transaction.
20. Youth is defined as 18 years of age and under prior to the 2024 State Fair. Youth may also enter adult categories. Exhibits will be judged according to division rules.
21. Computerized entry tags will be mailed to exhibitors. Tags should not be altered. Exhibits having altered tags will not be accepted and may be disqualified.
22. Entries may be mailed to the South Dakota State Fair. Entries must be securely wrapped and boxed to prevent damage. Exhibitor is responsible for insurance. Entry tag must be attached to exhibit with a copy of Static Exhibit Entry Form to serve as packing slip and for check-in purposes. Draw a line through any item on the entry form not included with mailed exhibits. Entries must be received by the South Dakota State Fair office by August 27, 2024, to qualify for judging.
23. The South Dakota State Fair is not responsible for any loss or damage that may occur.
24. Exhibits may not be sold. Sales tags or advertising logos on exhibits will not be allowed.
25. Superintendents of the Horizons Hall, Horticulture, and Arts/Education Buildings may determine the eligibility of exhibits and may disqualify exhibits.
26. A division or class may be deleted if no entries are made for three years.
27. Items not claimed by December 31 will become property of the South Dakota State Fair.
28. On-grounds parking is prohibited without permits. Parking passes issued to campers are valid only for the campsites. They are not a valid anywhere else. If the vehicle does not fit within the boundaries of the campsite, the vehicle must be parked off the grounds. Any vehicle found on-grounds without the proper credential for the area in which it's parked is subject to towing. There will be zero tolerance for parking violations; we will no longer be making PA announcements or giving warnings. Violators will be towed.
29. The South Dakota State Fair has an electronic system at the gates for admission. All exhibitors must have an admission pass when entering the fairgrounds during the fair. It is recommended to purchase passes in advance to make for efficient entry into the fair. The majority of admission passes will have bar codes on them that will be scanned upon entry. Parking passes will be checked upon entry to the fairgrounds. Passes are only valid for the area and terms listed on the pass.
30. Fire Lanes: For safety purposes, any vehicle blocking a fire-lane will be towed at the owner's expense. There will be zero tolerance.
31. Premium checks will be mailed to exhibitors within 60 days of the State Fair. If an exhibitor's earnings total $\$ 600$ or over, a W-9 must be completed by the exhibitor before their check will be issued. Premium checks for the amount of $\$ 5$ and under will not be mailed out (some exceptions apply). Affected exhibitors will receive instructions on how to collect premium winnings.

## General Rules for Exhibiting Fruits

(Source: Preparing Horticultural Exhibits SH 98), by Dr. David Graper, Former Extension Horticulture Specialist, South Dakota State University):

- Write variety name on entry tag. If variety is unknown, then write "unknown variety" on entry tag.
- Select specimens in top quality and prime maturity.
- Clean and neatly trim specimens, to ensure uniformity.
- Select specimens free from disease, insect, or mechanical injury.
- Select correct number of specimens typical for variety.
- Specimens are free from soil, dust, spray residues, and other foreign matter.

## DIVISION 2 - VEGETABLES

## General Rules for Exhibiting Vegetables

(Source: Preparing Horticultural Exhibits SH 98), by Dr. David Graper, Former Extension Horticulture Specialist, South Dakota State University):

- Write variety name on entry tag. If variety is unknown, then write "unknown variety" on entry tag.
- Select specimens in top quality and prime maturity - the best stage for storing. Remember, bigger is not always better.
- Clean and neatly trim specimens to ensure uniformity.
- Select specimens free from disease, insect, or mechanical injury.
- Select specimens typical for variety.
- Plant and planter weight limit is 40 pounds.
- Specimens are free from soil, dust, spray residues, and other foreign matter.
- Select correct number of specimens for exhibiting.

Please note the change in number of specimens in some vegetable classes.

## DIVISION 3 - HEIRLOOM VEGETABLES

Heirloom vegetables are vintage varieties that have been preserved by passing seed down from generation to generation. These varieties are generally 50 to 100 years old, although many are much older. The demand for heirloom vegetables is rapidly increasing especially among consumers looking for unique flavor and freshness.

## General Rules for Exhibiting Heirloom Vegetables

- Refer to rules listed in Division 2 Vegetables.
- Must include history or background of specimen on 3" x 5" note card and attached to exhibit.

## DIVISION 4 - FRESH-CUT FLOWERS

The art and literature of the world testify to the universal love of flowers, as well as to the desire to possess them and have them near. Flowers provide color to liven up almost any garden. Many people enjoy bringing fresh-cut flowers indoors to brighten up a room and add a touch of color to the home.

## General Rules for Exhibiting in Fresh-Cut Flowers

- Indicate variety name on entry tag. If variety is unknown, then write "unknown variety" on entry tag.
- Horticulture Building will provide vases for exhibits.
- Flower should be free of insects.
- Choose blossoms same size.
- Foliage should be included with each stem but not below water line.

## DIVISION 8 - FLORAL ARRANGEMENTS

You are challenged to explore styles of floral arrangements. Incorporate elements of design, simplicity, harmony, and expression to create interesting and beautiful works of art. The elements of design are color, form, line, light, pattern, size, space, and texture. The principles of design are balance, contrast, dominance, proportion, rhythm, and scale.
General Rules for Exhibiting Floral Arrangements:

- Not all materials need to be grown by exhibitor.
- Fresh plant material with blooms must be used. No artificial flowers or foliage are allowed. Refinement is desired.
- Dried natural materials used in moderation may be dyed, painted, gilded, varnished, or otherwise treated. Fresh plant materials cannot be sprayed except for evergreens.
- Embellishments may be added to the design to bring out the theme.
- While all possible care will be taken, South Dakota State Fair is not responsible for loss/damage to exhibits or property of the exhibitor.

## DIVISION 10 - NATIVE WILDFLOWERS, GRASSES, AND OTHER PLANTS

Why is native landscaping important? Native landscaping provides an attractive, environmentally friendly landscape while reducing water and maintenance requirements. Native prairie grasses and wildflowers are excellent alternatives to traditional landscaping.

## General Rules for Exhibiting Native Wildflowers, Grasses, and Other Plants:

Resource: Grassland Plants of South Dakota and the Northern Great Plains, by James R. Johnson and Gary E. Larson, (South Dakota State University, 2007).
Note: In accordance with South Dakota Codified Law 38-22 (Noxious Weed Law), noxious weed and invasive plants are not permitted in exhibits. Please refer to the South Dakota Weeds Revised Edition 2017 for a listing of South Dakota noxious weeds.

- These can be collected in the wild or grown in your yard.
- Dried exhibits should be fully dry by air, water, or microwave. Glycerin and silica gel may be used.
- Freeze-dry materials, artificial colors, sprays, and dyes are not permitted. Exhibits should be collected in a bundle and wrapped in tissue paper.
- Fresh-cut flower blooms should be approximately the same size. Foliage should be included with each bloom but not below the water line. The Horticulture Building will provide vases.
- Live-potted plants should be free from defects, insects, and diseases. Care instructions may be written on 3 " $\times 5$ " card and attached to exhibit.

- Open to youth ages 18 years and younger.
- Work must be done by the Junior exhibitor with minimal assistance from an adult.
- Exhibitor must write variety name on entry tag. If variety is unknown, then write "unknown variety" on entry tag.
- Fresh-cut flower blooms should be approximately the same size. Foliage should be included with each bloom but not below the water line. The Horticulture Building will provide vases.
- Vegetables should be top quality and prime maturity. Select specimens that are uniform and free from disease, insect, or mechanical injury.

## Participation Rules: Who is Eligible?

1) Must be a member of the South Dakota Florist Association in good standing.
2) Must solely represent themselves as a single entry.
3) The Theme for the Horticulture Department this year will be announced June 15, 2024, via Facebook on "SD State Fair Horticulture Building" page and elsewhere or by contacting michael@mbgenetics.com.
4) Entries can be made directly to: Michael Bishop, Superintendent, SD State Fair Horticulture Exhibit, via email; michael@mbgenetics.com or by US mail to: SD State Fair Attn: Michael Bishop $10603^{\text {rd }}$ St SW Huron, SD 57350. Watch for announcements updating entry deadline dates. There is a \$50 entry fee for each contestant. One entry per contestant limit.

## Contest Rules:

1) One entry per contestant limit.
2) The entry must be contained within a $3^{\prime}$ wide $\times 3^{\prime}$ deep space and cannot exceed $8^{\prime}$ tall.
3) The entry will be displayed on a pedestal that is $11^{\prime \prime}$ wide at the base $\times 10.5^{\prime \prime}$ wide on the top $\times 34$ " tall provided by the State Fair Horticulture Show Management. This is a floral arrangement contest, and ALL entries must be contained within an appropriate vase that can freely sit on a pedestal provided for public viewing and judging.
4) Content of the entry must not exceed $\$ 300$ wholesale cost and an itemized price sheet for each design must be turned in prior to start of the contest.
5) The entry must be composed of no less than $80 \%$ fresh or dried botanicals.
6) Each contestant will have 45 minutes to publicly prepare their display beginning promptly at 10:30 am. An $8^{\prime} \times 8^{\prime}$ workspace and worktable will be provided adjacent to where the entry will be displayed for judging. The entrant is responsible for their own work within the provided area and cannot leave the area until submission of the entry without prior approval by management. All work must stop promptly at 11:15 am. Further instructions on the timed preparation portion, public display and other information will be explained beginning at 10:15 am. ALL contestants must be present for this meeting. All design work must be done in front of the judges and the public. NOTHING can be done beforehand.
7) Signs with designer name, flower shop represented, address and arrangement name can be displayed on 3'x3' premade sign that can be displayed on an easel provided by the Horticulture Building management.
8) Once design work is stopped each contestant will be allowed up to 3 minutes to speak to the public and the judges to explain their arrangement. This portion of the contest will be broadcast LIVE on the Horticulture Building Facebook site.
9) Professional judging will be throughout the whole design process and each contestant will be observed as they work to build their entry. Winner of the Professional Judging will be announced Sunday, September 1. In case of a tie, the placing by the SD State Fair Manager will break the tie.
10) People's Choice judging will begin at 12:00 noon, Saturday, and continue throughout the day until closing of the Horticulture Building for the evening ( $7: 00 \mathrm{pm}$ ). The winner of the People's Choice will be announced and prominently displayed in the Mirror Room on Sunday, September $1^{\text {st }}$ along with all other contest entries. There will be advertisements throughout the day on Facebook and state-wide media news outlets as well as interviews of the $1^{\text {st }}$ and $2^{\text {nd }}$ place winners for the Sunday evening news broadcasts.
11) Winner of the People's Choice entry will receive a rotating plaque, public announcement over the fairgrounds, prominent display in the mirror room and a check for $\mathbf{\$ 7 5 0}$. Second place will receive an award as well (TBD).
